The IOCARIBE Secretary introduced this item. He briefly reviewed the list of working documents and reminded the Session that the report would be focused on recommendations. The Secretary reminded that draft recommendations would be discussed at the Recommendations committee. The Action Paper was intentionally drafted as a pre-report in order to streamline the reporting process during the session. Member States that wished to have specific, particularly important, plenary interventions recorded, were invited to provide written records thereof in one of the three languages of the Sub-commission, to be annexed to the report, in their original language as an informational annex to this report. A template and a dedicated e-mail address (p.wills-velez@unesco.org) was set up to this end (IOC/SC-IOCARIBE-XVI/Inf. 1 Add.). 15. In accordance with rule of procedure 8.1(a), Mr. Arnulfo Sanchez (Panama) the IOCARIBE Chairperson, delivered an oral statement on recent developments in the work of the Sub-Commission since the Fifteenth Session of IOCARIBE (Aruba, May 6 – 10, 2019) and perspectives for the coming years.

### 3.2 IOCARIBE SECRETARY'S REPORT ON THE WORK ACCOMPLISHED SINCE THE FIFTEENTH SESSION AND BUDGET IMPLEMENTATION

- 16. The IOCARIBE Secretary introduced this agenda item. He referred to the programme progress and to the implementation of decisions and recommendations during the period 2019 2021, particularly those made at the Fifteenth Session of the Sub-Commission held in Aruba, May 2019.
- 17. In particular he mentioned those initiatives for Disaster Risk Reduction and Ecosystem-based management, including: (i) IOCARIBE-GOOS establishment of a pilot project on Improvement of Hurricane Observing Forecasting Capacity; (ii) development of an operational region-wide information and forecasting system for sargassum and oil spills; and (iii) development of a guide on best management practices for sargassum events in the coastal environment; iv) HAB-ANCA initiative in the IOCARIBE Region to implement the IOC Ciguatera Strategy. IOCARIBE Member States, expert networks, and education and research institutions are focusing on their contribution to the UN Decade, and to the SDG 14 implementation progress and challenges.
- 18. He referred to The UN Decade of Ocean Science Regional virtual Workshop for the Western Tropical Atlantic (WTA), 28–29 April 2020, that provided a regional contribution to the UN Decade with a focus on IOCARIBE countries' and territories' needs and priorities in terms of transforming knowledge systems; accelerating transfer of technology; enabling training and

education; fostering science-policy dialogues, and enabling scientific solutions to the Region's socio-economic challenges.

19. IOCARIBE, as the WTA Ocean Decade Coordination mechanism has the overall responsibility for formulation of principles and strategy, and for planning and coordination of the Ocean Decade in the Western Tropical Atlantic region in consultation with the many leading UN, NGO, science, regional organisations, private sector, indigenous and local communities and other stakeholders of the region.

20. He reported that IOCARIBE established on October 2020 a Regional Planning Group (WTA RPG) for the WTA-Ocean Decade to advance and coordinate strategic partnerships and actions for Western Tropical Atlantic engagement in the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021-2030). The WTA RPG established eight Working Groups to promote multi-disciplinary and inclusive co-design and implementation partnerships to achieve each societal outcome and Capacity Development, recognizing the importance of the work of the Working Groups as the core of its strategy for advancing the Decade in the Western Tropical Atlantic Region.

The IOCARIBE Secretary highlighted key achievements, including the progress made 21. i) in the development of an operational region-wide information and forecasting system for sargassum and oil spills; where IOCARIBE, GEO Blue Planet and other partners developed a Tropical Atlantic Sargassum Information Hub to improve communication among stakeholders, and increase visibility of sargassum activities. The Sargassum Information Hub was launched on July 2020 ((sargassumhub.org); ii) A Regional Pilot Programme for Satellite Oil Spill monitoring for the wider Caribbean region is the first step for the development of a coordinated region-wide monitoring and forecasting system that started March 2021. Trinidad and Tobago has been selected as a test area given its abundance of oil facilities and monitoring needs; iii) Caribbean Marine Atlas (CMA) MS and Partners aimed to consolidate the CMA sustainability and ensuring continuity and upgrading of the CMA2 by hosting, operating, and maintaining the CMA2 at INVEMAR facilities; and to strengthen links and develop synergies with projects and programmes. Particularly, with i) CMA - CLME+ project ii) IHO Meso-American Caribbean Sea Hydrographic Commission (MACHC), IOCARIBE contribution to the SeaBed 2030 programme; iii) the Sargassum Information and Forecasting System; and iv) with the newly started IOC of UNESCO Ocean InfoHub project. He highlighted the significant contribution of the OTGA Regional Training Centre established at INVEMAR to the capacity development of MS in ocean sciences.

22. He mentioned that as part of IOCARIBE efforts and partnerships with CLME+, UN and Regional organisations and national agencies, the Sub-commission developed in cooperation with University of Ghent (Belgium) the CLME+ Training and Capacity Development (TCD) Portal that was launched 15th December 2020 to bridge the information gap between "those (marine practitioners) in search of training opportunities" and "those providing training and capacity building initiatives" (clmeplus.mainetraining.org).

23.

He also stressed the importance of the IOCARIBE and IHO Meso-American and Caribbean Sea Hydrographic Commission – MACHC partnership. IOCARIBE and MACHC Member States developed a joint strategy (December 2020, January 2021) to complete baseline seabed map of the MACHC/ IOCARIBE Region by 2030 that informs the sustainable, multi-purpose use of this region of the Ocean, as a contribution to the Nippon Foundation GEBCO Seabed 2030 Project and the UN Decade. IOCARIBE and MACHC have identified respective capacity development training offerings for 2020 and 2021 and considered cosponsoring those of common interest to avoid duplication of effort and maximize impact. In 2020 they agreed on a MACHC-IOCARIBE Seabed 2030 Work Plan for 2021; and as a part of their contribution to SEABED 2030, they will be sharing, delivery and management of marine spatial data holdings through pilot projects with partners such as the IOC/IODE and the IOCARIBE Caribbean Marine Atlas.

- 24. As well, IOCARIBE is developing jointly with MS national Agencies and Institutions, the LAC Regional Node for the IOC Ocean Information Hub (LAC OceanInfo Hub) with the technical support of IODE and the financial support of the Government of Flanders (Kingdom of Belgium).
- 25. He referred to the Sub-commission's financial situation and confirmed that the IOCARIBE Secretariat has been implementing the workplans in accordance with the budgetary allocations. He commented on the current financial situation for UNESCO, IOC and its Subsidiary Bodies including IOCARIBE and highlighted the work achieved by the Sub-commission despite financial difficulties and constraints. He also mentioned the financial and planning impact of Covid-19 on the IOCARIBE activities development and implementation and stressed that the staffing situation at the Secretariat remains critical.
- 26. He mentioned the support provided to the Sub-commission by several member states and the secondment of professionals as an example of such support. Particularly, the support provided by Colombia that is hosting the Secretariat and is seconding two professionals who are working at the Secretariat and also highlighted the contributions from Barbados, the Government of Flanders (The Kingdom of Belgium), Mexico, Panama, Korea, the EU, and US. Co-operation and partnerships with other UN Agencies and Programmes such as WMO, UNEP, UN-ISDR, UNDP, UNOPS, IAEA, the World Bank International, regional organizations (GOs and NGOs), and the work with national agencies facilitated programme and project implementation.
- 27. The IOCARIBE Secretary highlighted the importance of partnerships for programme implementation and financial support and urged Member States to keep constant communication with their UNESCO National Commissions, who are critical in budget discussions at UNESCO Governing Bodies.

29. The IOC Executive Secretary, Mr. Vladimir Ryabinin introduced this agenda item.

30. He referred to the Draft IOC Medium-Term Strategy for 2022–2029 (41 C/4) and reminded Member States that the document, already reviewed by the IOC Assembly at its 30th session in 2019, builds on the current IOC Medium-term Strategy, 2014–2021 (IOC/INF-1314), preserving the comprehensive framework of six functions for its implementation, while at the same time attempting to further clarify and sharpen the proposed vision statement and five High-Level Objectives of the Commission.

31. He reminded the Assembly that the next draft will be circulated to Intersessional Financial Advisory Group (IFAG) in the intersessional period leading to the 43rd session of the Executive Council in 2020 and the final adoption of the IOC Medium-Term Strategy 2022–2029 by the 31st session of the IOC Assembly in 2021. He also mentioned that this process should lead the reflection across the IOC on how the core IOC programmes and initiatives can contribute to the objectives of the Decade; and submit to the IOC Assembly, at its 30th session, an overview of such an IOC programmatic contribution, building on document IOC/INF-1357 and consistent with the steps for the preparation of the next IOC Medium-Term Strategy for 2022–2029.

He referred to the work of the IOC Group of Experts on Capacity Development, to the recommendations and findings provided by the GE-CD Task Team relating to the revision of the IOC Capacity Development Strategy 2015-2021; the challenges and objectives promoted by the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development, the outcomes of the 2nd GE-CD Survey, and to the extension of the current Strategy until 2023.

35. Mr. Francisco Brizuela, IOCARIBE Vice-Chair introduced this Agenda Item.

36. He referred to the IOCARIBE Medium Term Strategic Science Plan (2017-2026) its goals and Main Lines of Action of the Plan: i) Oceans and Climate, ii) Ocean Ecosystem Science, including Science for Large Marine Ecosystem Management, iii) Marine Science for Integrated Coastal Area Management and iv) Extreme Natural Hazards. He described the purpose of the Plan that includes providing / facilitating / catalyzing science for decision making process for marine stewardship and societal benefit.

37. He stressed the need to take into consideration existing Environmental Agreements in the region to provide necessary science and capacity development for IOCARIBE Member States to contribute to the achievement of proposed goals of the Agenda 2030. He recognized that IOC Science scope is broad, in the IOCARIBE Region it is necessary to aligned and recognize the region's priorities.

He reiterated on the need to update the plan to include main actions and engagement of the Sub commission in the Un Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021-2030).

39. The updating process of the Science Plan will be led by one of the IOCARIBE Vice-Chairs. For that purpose, a working group should be established and will work online and by e-mail. The updated version of the IOCARIBE Science Plan will be circulated by e-mail to Member States for their approval and endorsement.

- 41. Mr. Arthur Paterson, IOCARIBE Vice-Chair introduced this Agenda. He gave a general overview about the Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021 2030) and highlighted the main purpose of this session dedicated to the Decade. Mr. Paterson acted as Moderator for this Session dedicated to the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development.
- 42. He recalled that, in December 2017, the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) proclaimed the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development from 2021 to 2030, building on the efforts of IOC Member States and the IOC Secretariat. The period 2018–2020 focused on the preparation of the Decade Implementation Plan under the guidance of the Decade Executive Planning Group. The Decade commenced on 1 January 2021.
- 43. He recalled that this is the second IOCARIBE formal discussion on the UN Decade in the past 4 years. IOCARIBE's first substantive introduction to the Decade was in 2019. Since that time:

- The Decade Implementation Plan was completed and accepted by the UN General Assembly
- IOCARIBE took a lead role in the region with UN Environment and others to coordinate partners to host the April 2020 Western Tropical Atlantic Workshop which Lorna Innis described, and
- launched numerous seminars and outreach on Decade organizational processes, such as co-design, youth engagement, and much more.
- This session arrives at a critical juncture We are moving from a 3-4 year global planning phase and public visibility process to an engagement and empowerment phase in which no one is left behind.
- 45. Member States, regional stakeholders together are considering how to enhance their collaboration to apply transformative science to achieve the SDGs not just Goal 14 but all the goals for which ocean science has a direct impact on human welfare, jobs, regional environment concerns and planetary processes essential for maintaining life as we know it today.
- 46. Our goal today is to inform you as to the diverse avenues in which IOCARIBE Member States and the broad suite of stakeholders can join the Decade process and at the same time build the IOCARIBE program to achieve the SDGs and associated capacity development through all activities.
- 47. The main objective of this Decade Session was to inspire IOCARIBE Member States to self-organize their participation in the Decade through Informing countries on practical ways to become involved in the Decade by:
  - Creating national committees
  - Define needs and capacity requirements and strengths as the engine for partnership with others within and beyond borders.
  - Co-designing with partners across the region (and beyond) to leverage capabilities to achieve national science, policy, management and SDG goals.
  - Build synergies/intersections to capitalize existing strengths across disciplines and boundaries – "We can do more together than we can do alone."
  - Develop diverse partnerships. They are the strong ones: inclusive, diverse, equity, youth, gender, local and indigenous.
  - Put in place a process that will last a Decade, will raise capacity, engage, and empower, and solve problems.
- 48. He stressed that the Regional Planning Thematic Working Groups will be an instrumental mechanism for Member States to engage with partners across the region.
- 49. Mr. Paterson introduced Mr. Ariel Troisi, the current Chairperson of the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission (IOC) to refer the Sub-commission's participation in the Decade.
- 50. Following the Decade Regional Planning workshops that were held throughout 2019 and 2020, informal stakeholders' platforms have been established in several regions to advance the identification of regional initiatives and programmes for the Ocean Decade.

- 51. He referred to the importance of the National Decade Committees (NDC) which have been / will be established to facilitate national coordination of Decade activities. These national multi-agency and multi-stakeholder platforms involve the national political and scientific institutions and actors concerned by the ocean and its management. Existing national coordinating mechanisms can provide the basis for performing such functions. The NDC will engage the national ocean community (a wide variety of local and sub-national stakeholders) and facilitate co-design of initiatives (programmes, projects, and contributions) across groups of stakeholders that can be endorsed as Decade Actions. They will also facilitate hosting of sub-regional or regional meetings related to the Decade.
- 52. Lastly, Mr. Troisi made a reference to the impact of Covid 19 on regional activities.
- 53. Several National Decade Committees have been established in the Western Tropical Atlantic Region. Following Member States were invited to present their experiences Brazil, Colombia and Mexico.

- 54. Mrs. Lorna Inniss, Coordinator, UN Environment Programme's Secretariat of the Cartagena Convention for the Protection and Development of the Marine Environment of the Wider Caribbean (UNEP) introduced this Agenda Item.
- 55. As part of the Preparatory Process of the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021-2030) a virtual meeting for the Western Tropical Atlantic (WTA-Ocean Decade) was held on April 28-29, 2020. This meeting was coordinated by the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission's (IOC of UNESCO) Sub-Commission for the Caribbean and Adjacent Regions IOCARIBE Secretariat. It was hosted by UNAM (Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico) and co-organized by the Government of Mexico with the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission (IOC) as coordinating body for The Decade and the Secretariat of the Cartagena Convention (UN Environment). Over 600 scientists, policymakers, program managers, and government officials, representatives from tourism and maritime sectors, private enterprises, non-governmental organizations, and communicators engaged before and during the meeting.
- 56. She recalled that regional priorities were established, and new and expanded stakeholders and partnerships were identified through the WTA questionnaires, presentations and messaging. IOCARIBE and the WTA Steering Committee seek to maintain momentum and coordinate the follow-up including establishment of a formal regional coordination process.
- Mrs. Inniss referred to the importance of taking advantage of every opportunity to mobilize countries to implement what they say they would do on meetings and referred to the need to focus on the Grand Actions and Grand Challenges agreed during the Western Tropical Atlantic Workshop and how we would like to commit Member States on the Intergovernmental process. This meeting brings an excellent platform to involve MS and establish partnerships.

- 59. Mr. Arthur Paterson, IOCARIBE Vice-Chair introduced this agenda item.
- 60. He informed the Session that as instructed by Recommendation SC-IOCARIBE.XV.2 May 2019 for the UN Decade in the Region, the IOCARIBE Secretary, in consultation with the IOCARIBE Officers and members of the WTA Steering Committee, agreed to establish a Regional Planning Group (WAT RPG) for the UN Decade of Ocean Science to advance and coordinate strategic partnerships and actions for Western Tropical Atlantic engagement in the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021-2030)

#### 5.4 EASTERN TROPICAL PACIFIC ACTIVITIES

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- 68. Mrs. Elva Escobar from the National University of Mexico UNAM and member of the UN Decade Executive Planning Group (EPG) and WTA RPG introduced this agenda item.
- 69. As part of the Ocean Decade Virtual Series, a Meeting was convened for Co-designing the Ocean Science we need for the Eastern Tropical Pacific on January 28, 2021 from 10:00 am 12:00 pm The UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development 2021-2030.
- 70. The recommendations of this virtual event recognized that continuous co-design is required for success of long-term actions involving fishermen, governmental sectors, and the best science and technology available. Recognizing unique opportunities and the timing is relevant for funding specific processes in addition to motivation and commitment. These recommendations will be fundamental to bring forward transformative Co-Design in the region during the next decade.
- 71. Main next steps were defined by the need of regional actions and a regional strategic plan that includes training sessions and actions in partnership with multi-stakeholder and user's participation to explore major investments for science ocean observing systems. With an appropriate use of research, reaching the decision making, establishing knowledge sharing and data platforms and connecting communities, private sector, current and new partners.

- 72. On her intervention Mrs. Escobar highlighted on the importance to co-develop science in relation to the region's major needs and recommendations and the gaps observed in many of the ocean decade outputs. She emphasized on science's central role in society, the ocean solutions to challenges and to benefit people, nature and the economy and consider engaging traditional knowledge holders and gender to be able to achieve the Ocean we want for sustainable development.
- 73. She stressed on the importance of capacity development and ocean literacy to promote an ocean science culture so people are better informed on opportunities with a healthier ocean, sustainable use of marine resources in the region and mentioned some examples.
- 74. Mrs. Escobar referred to the Early Careers Ocean Professionals (ECOPS) in activities and projects dedicated to the promotion of science as a lever of action to build sustainable societies.

- 76. Mr. Arnulfo Sanchez, IOCARIBE Chairperson introduced this agenda item.
- 77. He referred to the Session about the kick-off event of the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development is planned to take place in Berlin, Germany, from the 31st of May to the 2nd of June 2021. It will be hosted by the Federal Ministry of Education and Research of Germany.
- 78. IOCARIBE Chairperson informed about the activities and events organised by the WTA Regional Planning Group in preparation of the UN Decade Regional Kick-off Conference to be held in conjunction with IOCARIBE International Ocean Science Conference scheduled for October 2021.
- 79. The activities include a series of workshops, webinars and other events organised by WTA Working Groups where stakeholders, experts, socio-economic partners, national, regional and UN organisations, industry and the private sector, indigenous and local communities will jointly co-design those transformative actions needed to respond to the Region needs.
- 80. He invited all MS to contribute to the Conference preparation, provide recommendations and suggestions, and actively work nationally and regionally promoting the UN Decade and connecting their national science and socio-economic plans with the UN Decade.

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#### 5.6 IOCARIBE, UN OCEAN DECADE AND SUSTAINABLE OCEAN ECONOMY

Mr. Marck Oduber, IOC Vice-Chair introduced this agenda item.

He referred to the importance of the Sustainable Ocean Economy and its implications for the Small Island States and countries in general in the IOCARIBE Region. He referred to the initiatives currently going on in the IOCARIBE Region and introduced the panellists to oversee this segment during the Session.

#### 5.6.1 Tourism and recreation opportunities in oceans and coasts

This item was divided into two sections: (i) "Blue tourism: Opportunities in Oceans and Coasts in the Caribbean" presented by Mr.. Jorge Ridderstaat, Assistant Professor, of The University of Central Florida, at the Rosen College of Hospitality Management Tourism. His presentation focused on the possibilities of the ocean and coastal use from a tourism perspective. He also emphasized some preconditions to consider when developing or expanding this opportunity. Specifically, he discussed the sustainability issue and the socioeconomic context of Caribbean destinations that need to be considered; and (ii) "Opportunities and gaps for enabling a Blue Economy in the Caribbean" introduced by Mr. Andrés Cisneros-Montemayor, Deputy Director and Principal Investigator, Nippon Foundation Ocean Nexus Program.: A Blue Economy aims to establish ocean sectors that are socially equitable, environmentally sustainable, and economically viable. The Caribbean region has deep relationships with ocean environments and has been a leader in planning for future ocean development. Mr. Cisneros-Montemayor talk draws from recent multidisciplinary research to highlight key opportunities and gaps to help that process.

#### 5.6.2 Enhance the resilience of oceans, and coasts

Mr. Gerald Singh, Assistant Professor Department of Geography, Memorial University of Newfoundland introduced this item and his talk "Building capacity for coastal sustainable development facing global change in the Caribbean" complemented some of the other talks, including on climate impacts and sustainable ocean economy. He focused on governance frameworks to allow for coordinated action to build resilient and sustainable coastal systems and development.

#### 5.6.3 Climate Change (e.g. carbon sequestration and conversion, renewable energy)

86. Mr. Leonard A. Nurse, Retired Professor, Faculty of Science and Technology, University of the West Indies, Cave Hill Campus, Barbados from CERMES introduced this agenda item with a presentation titled "The Ocean: Climate change impacts and opportunities, with special reference to the Caribbean."

He focused on key impacts of climate change and climate variability on ocean processes and resources critical marine ecosystems that support the economies and livelihoods of Caribbean peoples. In alignment with the principles of the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development, the viability and use of nature-based approaches to respond to these risks were discussed, and opportunities for optimizing some as yet unexploited and under-utilized ocean energy resources were explored.

#### 5.6.4 Enhancing IOCARIBE exposure in Sustainable Ocean Economy

Mr. Andrei Moarcas Environment & Energy Officer at the Association of the Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTA) introduced this agenda item with a presentation titled "Realising the Potential of the Overseas Countries and Territories for Sustainable Blue Growth - an OCTA Study." The presentation included a short description of OCTA, its vision and its actions. He provided a general outline of the work currently being undertaken on a Study

covering the Overseas Countries and Territories, aiming to clarify the current status and the next steps to be taken for OCTs to accelerate the full transition towards Sustainable Ocean Economy. The transition to a more integrated ocean-based economy is an achievable objective for most countries and the Study can serve as a source of inspiration for other economies in the region.

89. The IOCARIBE Secretary discussed the opportunities a sustainable ocean economy represents to IOCARIBE Member States, and in particular Island States most of them classified as middle-income countries and highly dependent on ocean and coastal resources. He referred to high socio-economic disruption produced by the pandemic that also showed the possibility of a healthy and productive ocean. He related the present situation and the ocean sciences contribution to the recovery of the region and the potential of the UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development.

The IOCARIBE Chairman invited MS to consider developing IOCARIBE initiatives responding and supporting the Region sustainable ocean economy.
