- 3. The OCM does not have legal personality
- 4. The MOU is <u>not a legally binding instrument</u>; it <u>does not impose any legal</u> <u>obligations or commitments</u> on its Signatories (*Article I.3*)
- Provisions under the OCM MOU <u>do not affect in any way the sovereign rights</u> of the (prospective) OCM Member States

The **OCM objectives** are (Article 2):


a. to support and enhance <u>regional</u> and <u>intersectoral</u> communication, collaboration and coordination

c. to promote actions towards (common) ocean-related goals and commitments

d. to promote wider-ranging partnerships

- Through the OCM MOU, <u>Signatories do not intend to modify their own specific</u> <u>mandates</u>. The MOU acknowledges and respects the distinct mandates, functions and competences of the IGOs that are Signatories to the MOU. (*Article XIV.1c*)
- 7. The OCM <u>does not compete with</u>, but rather <u>supports its Member IGOs</u>. By providing a <u>common platform</u>, the OCM will <u>empower each and any of its</u> <u>Signatories in the exercise of their mandate</u>. The OCM will help avoid duplication, create or enhance synergies and enable greater efficiency and effectiveness in the work of the Signatories (*Article VI.2*).





SUGGESTED RECOMMENDATION

The Sub-Commission:

- i. Give due consideration to signing the OCM MoU and become an OCM Member at their earliest convenience, if they have not yet joined, with the support of the IOCARIBE Secretariat and the PROCARIBE+ Project Unit.
- ii. Participate in the First Meeting of the OCM Steering Group, either as OCM Members or as Observers.
- iii. Consider, in the context of the UN Decade and through their national representatives to the OCM, supporting a possible SGM1 Decision to upscale the OCM Functions of "Coordinate knowledge management and facilitate data and information sharing" and "Strengthen science-policy interfaces" from the category of "Complementary Function" to the category of "Core Function".
- iv. make good use of the opportunity provided through the PROCARIBE+ funding to demonstrate, to the best possible extent, the added value of the OCM during the 2025-2028 period
